Principal's message

As a staff have been looking closely at our **attendance data** here at St. Paul's, and we have noticed some instances of low attendance. This observation highlights the need for us all to work together to ensure every child is present and engaged in their learning journey as much as possible. **We ask families to ensure their child is attending school unless they are sick.** We are committed to supporting all our students to achieve their best, and consistent attendance is a key factor in this.

Regular school attendance is fundamental to your child's success, not just academically, but also socially and emotionally.

- Academic Progress: Each school day builds upon the last. When a child misses school, they miss crucial instruction, class discussions, and hands-on learning activities. Even a single missed day can create gaps in their understanding, making it harder to grasp new concepts and keep pace with their classmates. Over time, these small gaps can accumulate, significantly impacting their foundational skills in reading, writing, and mathematics. Research consistently shows a strong link between regular attendance and higher academic achievement.
- Social and Emotional Development: School is a vital place for children to develop essential social skills. Daily interactions with peers and teachers help them build friendships, learn teamwork, practice communication, and develop empathy. Being present fosters a sense of belonging and connection to the school community, which is crucial for their overall well-being and confidence.
- **Building Routines and Responsibility**: Consistent attendance helps children establish important routines, punctuality, and a strong work ethic. These are invaluable life skills that will benefit them throughout their schooling and well into their future careers. It teaches them the importance of commitment and responsibility.
- **Future Opportunities:** The habits and knowledge gained through regular school attendance lay a strong foundation for future success. Students with consistent attendance are more likely to complete their education, pursue higher learning, and have broader career opportunities.
- **Legal Obligation:** It is also important to remember that consistent school attendance is a legal requirement.

As we continue our journey through Term 3, we look forward to all that we will achieve together. Thank you for being such an integral part of the St Paul's family, as we truly walk together in faith and learning.

REPORT

Bullying can be reported by students or caregivers at any time to a member of staff verbally or in writing. The report will be acknowledged within 1 school day.

RECORD

Staff member records the incident on QR code and informs a member of the Leadership Team.

RESPONSE TO BULLYING **AT ST PAUL'S**

INVESTIGATE

A member of the Leadership Team will investigate the incident within 1-2 school days.

ACTION

Leadership Team discusses and implements appropriate actions, that may include restorative conversations, mediation, discipline and support.

COMMUNICATION

Open communication is maintained with parents/caregivers throughout the process. All communication is recorded on Toddle.





NAPLAN Results

NAPLAN results for students in Years 3 and 5 have been sent home this week. These individual reports provide an insight into your child's progress in literacy and numeracy compared to national benchmarks.

Australian Mathematics Competition

On Tuesday August 5th, 51 students from Years 3 to 6 took part in the Australian Mathematics Competition (AMC), the largest and longest running maths competition for school students in the country. The AMC challenged students with a variety of engaging and thought-provoking problems, designed to test their mathematical thinking and problem-solving skills. Our students approached the challenge with enthusiasm, persistence, and a positive mindset. It was a fantastic opportunity for them to extend their learning and apply their skills in new and exciting ways.

Congratulations to all participants for their hard work and dedication - we are proud of your efforts!

Sally Rippin Excursion

On Friday August 1st, the Grade 1 and 2 students travelled to Essington Primary School for an author talk with Sally Rippin, one of Australia's highest-selling female authors. She has written over 100 books for children and young adults, many of them award-winning, including the Billie B Brown and Hey Jack! series. As the current Australian Children's Laureate (2024-2025), Sally is travelling around the country to chat about the ways we can share stories and support all children to read.

2025 NAPLAN

Information for parents and carers



NAPLAN is a national literacy and numeracy assessment undertaken by students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9. It is the only national assessment that all Australian children undertake. Literacy and numeracy skills are the critical foundation for all learning and for the ability to participate effectively in society. NAPLAN questions assess content linked to the Australian Curriculum in English and Mathematics. NAPLAN tests are only one aspect of each school's assessment and reporting process. As they are held once every 2 years for each student, they cannot replace the extensive, ongoing assessments made by teachers about student performance. Your child's teacher will have the best insight into your child's educational progress. Along with other school assessment reports, NAPLAN individual student reports can be used to discuss your child's progress with their teacher.

How does NAPLAN assess students?

NAPLAN tests are delivered online to schools across Australia in March each year. Online assessment presents questions tailored to an individual student's responses, delivering more precise results and a more engaging test experience for students.

Questions in NAPLAN are based mostly on the literacy and numeracy knowledge and skills students have learnt from previous years of schooling. A few questions assess additional content from the year of testing and the following year. These questions have been designed so that they can be answered using strategies students have learnt in previous years. This ensures students of all abilities can show their capabilities.

Detailed information on the knowledge and skills being measured in NAPLAN is available at www.nap.edu.au.

Proficiency standards

Since 2023, NAPLAN results have been reported against proficiency standards that provide clear information on student achievement. The standards are set at a challenging but reasonable level expected for the student at the time of NAPLAN testing, based mainly on what has been taught in previous years of schooling.

The proficiency standards include 4 proficiency levels:

- Exceeding: The student's result exceeds expectations at the time of testing.
- **Strong:** The student's result meets challenging but reasonable expectations at the time of testing.
- Developing: The student's result indicates that they are working towards expectations at the time of testing.
- Needs additional support: The student's result indicates that they are not achieving the learning outcomes expected at the time of testing. They are likely to need additional support to progress satisfactorily.

What NAPLAN assesses has not changed. Page 4 of the individual student report provides a more detailed summary about what students know and can do within each of the proficiency levels. Further information is available at www.nap.edu.au.

How were the proficiency levels determined?

Panels of expert teachers identified the levels of proficiency against learning expectations for each assessment area and year level. Parent and carer input on student reports was also provided through focus groups and national parent organisations.

Reading the NAPLAN report

The NAPLAN report shows a proficiency scale for each assessment area (numeracy, reading, writing, spelling and grammar and punctuation) with a student's result shown as a black dot on the scale.

The report shows each child's achievement against the national average for their year (shown as a black triangle) and the range of achievement for the middle 60% of students in their year level (shown as a light shaded rectangle).

NAPLAN is a valuable tool that can give useful insights into a student's performance, but individual reports should be interpreted with care as they reflect the student's performance on the day of testing, rather than being a definitive measure of their overall learning.



What if my child's report says they took their test on paper?

While NAPLAN is an online test, there are a small number of circumstances where students may complete tests on paper. These include when:

- · schools use a recognised alternative curriculum
- students require paper tests for accessibility reasons
- issues during testing require paper tests to be used as a contingency measure.

Year 3 students always complete their writing test on paper.

Can I compare my child's performance to previous NAPLAN reports?

Results from 2023 onwards cannot be directly compared with results from 2008 to 2022. This is because a new measurement scale that is more suited to the online tests was introduced with the new standards, and because the tests were moved from Term 2 to Term 1.

However, in 2025 students in Years 5, 7 and 9 were the first to complete 2 cycles of NAPLAN under the new reporting arrangement. This means that parents and carers can use the individual student reports they received in 2023 and 2025 to compare their child's proficiency levels.

A student's results compared to the national average and middle 60% of students can also be compared across 2023 and 2025.

As students move through the NAPLAN years, the skills and understanding required to achieve each proficiency level increase in difficulty. A student who achieves the same proficiency level in successive years, such as Year 3 and Year 5, may still be making progress.

How does NAPLAN help my child?

NAPLAN allows parents and carers to see how their child has performed in literacy and numeracy against national standards. Your child's achievement can be compared to the national average of all students in the same year and against the proficiency levels.

Results can help parents, carers and students to discuss individual student progress with teachers.

What impact will the results have on my child's future?

NAPLAN results provide important information about literacy and numeracy skills that your child is learning through their school curriculum. The results complement other assessments your child does at school, providing you and your child's teachers with an understanding of your child's achievements at the time of the tests. The information can be used to support your child to reach their full potential.

Some schools may ask for NAPLAN reports, in addition to school reports, as part of their admissions process. NAPLAN is not designed to be a school admission test. However, results may be useful for informing a new school of a student's learning needs.

How does NAPLAN help my child's school?

NAPLAN is the only national assessment that all Australian children undertake. It helps:

- teachers to better identify students who need greater
 - challenges or extra support
- schools to identify strengths and areas of need in teaching programs
- schools to set goals in literacy and numeracy
- school systems to review programs and support offered to schools.

NAPLAN also provides nationally comparable data to help governments evaluate how education programs are working and whether students are meeting important literacy and numeracy standards.

Who else will see the results?

Each year, test administration authorities provide schools with results for all students who sit NAPLAN. Schools are encouraged to use the results to inform their planning for improvement across the school.

Individual student reports are confidential. No-one but your local test administration authority and staff at your child's school will see your child's report.

Average school results are publicly reported on My School at www.myschool.edu.au. The website will be updated with each year's results towards the end of the year. Your child's individual results are not available on My School.

NCCD

The National Consistent Collection of Data (NCCD) has now been finalised for this year. This important process involves gathering evidence of the adjustments and supports in place for students with diverse learning needs. The information collected helps ensure that the right resources and supports remain available to meet the needs of our students. Adjustments may take many forms and are tailored to meet individual student needs. These can include literacy intervention, morning movement routines, access to sensory spaces such as the Engine Room and Calm Room, sensory breaks, and support from Inclusion Support Assistants (ISAs). They might also involve modified learning tasks, small group or 1:1 support, and the use of specific tools or resources.

EAP Meetings

In Week 8, there will be an opportunity for families who have a child with an Educational Adjustment Plan (EAP) to come in and discuss your child's goals with the classroom teacher, Inclusion Support Coordinator and Inclusion Support Assistant. Meetings will be held on Tuesday the 2nd, Wednesday the 3rd and Thursday the 4th of September. For some families, this will be a familiar process and a continuation of previous planning and review. For others, this may be your first time attending an EAP meeting. Meetings will be scheduled for 30 minutes each. A booking link will be sent out via Operoo next week. EAP documents will be sent to you in advance to allow time for review prior to your scheduled meeting.

Vision and Hearing

Ensuring your child's vision and hearing are in top shape is essential for their overall development and success in school. As vision and hearing are the primary senses through which we learn, early detection of vision and hearing issues can prevent learning difficulties and social challenges. Regular checks can catch problems early, allowing for timely interventions that support your child's academic performance and well-being. Healthy vision and hearing are crucial for effective communication, reading, and interacting with their environment.




